Key Vocabulary

Town	A built-up area with a name. These places have lots of houses and shops close by to each other.
Countryside	Land and scenery of a rural area. These places have lots of fields and farms.
House	A place where a person or family lives.
Detached	This is where it is separate. This type of house is on its own.
Semi-Detached	This is where it is joined to another house.
Terraced	This is where it is joined to several other houses.
Key	This is found on a map and is used to show where/ what things are.

Objectives

Use basic geographical vocabulary to refer to:

- key physical features, including: beach, cliff, coast, forest, hill, mountain, sea, ocean, river, soil, valley, vegetation, season and weather.
- key human features, including: city, town, village, factory, farm, house, office, port, harbour and shop.
- use aerial photographs and plan perspectives to recognise landmarks and basic human and physical features; devise a simple map and use and construct basic symbols in a key
