

## Objectives

Pupils should be taught about:

- name and locate the world's seven continents and five oceans.
- use world maps, atlases and globes to identify the United Kingdom and its countries, as well as the countries, continents and oceans studied at this key stage.
- use simple compass directions (North, South, East and West) and locational and directional language [for example, near and far; left and right], to describe the location of features and routes on a map.

## Key People

Sir Francis Drake



Drake was the first Englishman to sail around the world, circumnavigating the globe between 1577 and 1580.

Blackbeard



The pirate Blackbeard is perhaps the most notorious of sea robbers.

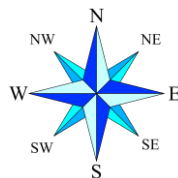

Anne Bonny



Anne Bonny became a notorious pirate operating in the Caribbean.

## Key Vocabulary

World	The world is the Earth and everything on it.
Continent	A very large area of land with countries in them.
Countries	An area of land with its own government.
Ocean	A constant area of water that covers most (70%) of the earth's surface.
Equator	An imaginary line that circles the earth halfway between the north and south poles. It faces the sun all year round.
border	Where one country meets another.
UK (United Kingdom)	An island made up of four countries – England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland
Compass	An instrument used to show North
Environment	A particular geographical area.
